Some time ago, there was an accident that took place when one of the cannonballs from a downrigger on a boat got tangled up on a submerged tree. This anchored the back of the boat to the bottom of the lake. It happened to be somewhat breezy that day. The breeze blew a quick couple of waves into the back of the boat. Now with two engines on the back of the boat, the extra weight of the water combined with the boat being anchored to a tree at the bottom of the lake, the back end of the boat submerged and the boat rolled upside down dumping everyone and everything out of the boat and into the lake.

A lot of you know some or all the people in the boat that day. We all know it could have been any one of us. Accidents like this happen so quickly and we can only try to be more prepared. So check your brakes on downriggers. Have your side cutters handy. I also know it's hard to do but the best place for your life jacket is on you and the other passengers in the boat. Please have fun, catch a lot of fish and be safe.

18th Annual Trout/Salmon Derby Scheduled

Included with this newsletter is a flier announcing the GPTSC's 18th Annual Trout/Salmon Derby. The derby will take place on Saturday, August 28, 2003, (rules meeting will be Friday, August 27th). Head-quarters for both the derby and rules meeting will be Sakakawea State Park at the main shelter — the same place as last year.

Entry fee is \$30.00 per team and all derby participants must be members of the Great Planers Trout and Salmon Club. Please note that derby entries postmarked before August 18th will be eligible for a \$30.00 cash drawing to be conducted during the Friday night rules meeting. The cash drawing is to encourage advanced registration, which is very helpful to derby officials in preparing for the event.

There will again be a limited addition derby T-shirts available to participants while supplies last.

Last year we started a new division for youngsters that are 12 and under that is called "Fish on Kid-Pass it On" in memory of long time fisherman Gaylord Johnson. The memorial fund will supply trophies and prizes for the top three placers in that division as well as gifts for each entrant. We will also have a youth division that is for kids 13-17 years of age and we will have prizes for those division winners as well. This is our future so please encourage kids to participate.

Derby applications can be obtained by contacting either of the above listed individuals for early submission or at the rules meeting.

As our rules have always stated, any Salmonnoid qualifies to be tagged. After years of stocking Lake Trout the possibility exists that we may catch a few of these fish. They are legal fish to bring to the scales. As these fish are not like the Salmon, they may live for years in our system and grow slowly each year and possibly find the right conditions to spawn and reproduce. The e-board has had discussion about promoting catch and release of Lake Trout. The Derby committee would like to encourage safe return of these fish during the Derby but respects your choice to keep and tag them. Sure it may mean the difference of a few places and cash but remember the possibility of catching that fish in a few years when it weighs in at more that 20 pounds.

18th ANNUAL GREAT PLANERS TROUT & SALMON DERBY RULES

- 1) ELIGIBILITY: All applicants 18 years of age or older must be members of the Great Planers Trout & Salmon Club. Send membership and entry forms to GPTS Derby P.O. Box 7085 Bismarck, ND 58507-7085.
- 2) EARLY REGISTRATION: All applications postmarked by August 18, 2004 will be eligible for a drawing for \$30.00 cash.
- **FISHING HEADQUARTERS:** Headquarters will be Sakakawea State Park at the main shelter. The starting point will be outside the State Park marina.
- 4) HOURS: Hours will be 7:00 a.m.- 4:00 p.m., CDT Saturday, August 28, 2004, and weigh-in will begin at noon. Rules meeting will be Friday, August 27, 2004 at 8:00 p.m. CDT at the Main shelter.
- **TEAMS:** Team is limited to 3 adults and/or junior anglers. Kids 12 and under do not count towards 3 person team limit. Six pole limit per boat.
- TAGGING: Each team will be issued 10 WHITE tags or in the case of a 1-person entry, 5 tags. When a fish is caught, you must decide immediately to keep and tag or release it. Any team found with an untagged fish will be disqualified immediately. Any Salmonoid qualifies to be tagged. One ORANGE tag will be issued to each Junior angler age 13 to 17. One GREEN tag will be issued to each Youth angler age 12 or under. Special colored tag, in addition to White team tag, must be secured on largest fish entry for Youth or Junior division before check point at start of weigh-in line. All unused tags must be returned at check in.
- 7) **SCORING:** Prizes shall be based on most weight in pounds and ounces of total catch, and for the largest Salmonoid. Teams shall observe all North Dakota Game & Fish Department Rules. Three-person teams can weigh in up to 10 fish.
- 8) WEIGH-IN: The weigh-in will be at Lake Sakakawea State Park, main shelter. All fish are subject to inspection by Tournament Officials. Fish must come directly from water to weigh-in.
- 9) **BOAT INSPECTION:** All boats and tackle will be inspected the morning of the derby, during and after. Anyone found cheating will be disqualified. All boats must carry predetermined tournament identification that will be handed out the morning of the derby at the launch site. All boats must be checked in by 6:50 a.m. CDT the morning of the derby.
- **LATE PENALTY:** Contestants who are not standing in weigh-in line by 4:00 p.m. CDT, will be penalized 5% of total weight for each minute late and be disqualified for largest fish prize. Over 15 minutes late will result in total disqualification.
- GENERAL RULES: Contestants may not leave their boats at any time. If an emergency exists, contact an official on VHF channel 16 or CB channel 11. It will be illegal to pull up to any other boat or to have another boat pull up to yours (except a patrol boat) during tournament hours. Interpretation of these rules will be left to the Tournament Committee. The decision of the Officials and Judges will be final in all matters.
- 12) PRIZES: Based on 100 teams: 1st \$550.00, 2nd \$350.00, 3rd \$250.00, 4th \$200.00, 5th \$150.00, 6th-10th \$75.00, 11th-15th \$50.00, 16th-20th \$25.00. If less than 100 teams entered, prizes will be prorated based on a percentage of teams entered.
- 13) LARGEST FISH CONTEST: Prizes will be awarded for the largest team fish in the team, Junior and Youth divisions. Junior division anglers must be 13 to 17 years of age. Youth division anglers must be 12 or under. Youth and Junior anglers must fight and land a fish before tagging it with a special colored tag and a team tag. Each Youth or Junior in a boat may tag a largest fish. Only one largest fish per team division may be entered. A fish may be entered in only one largest fish division.
- 14) DISCLAIMER: Promoters, tournament directors and organizations assisting in the tournament operation, their agencies, etc., are not responsible for death, injuries, damages, liability, theft, fire, or any loss of any kind to entrants. Each team, upon signing an entry form, will be in effect, signing a waiver form.

SALMONOID FACTOID

Have you ever been out fishing in deep water and get a release where by the time you get to the rod there is only slack line, then only to see a fish jumping behind your boat with a flasher that remarkably resembles yours? Yes, it's your fish, and after reeling up the slack line you're in for a beautiful tail walking battle.

Any other fish after coming unwillingly out of those amazing depths would be suffering from an over inflated air bladder. This is the organ that is used by fish to maintain their buoyancy. Scientists believe that it evolved into lungs allowing reptiles to leave the water. Back to the point though, salmonoids and few other fish have ducted air bladders. When a fish comes from deep water, the gas in the air bladder expands because of the decrease in water pressure. Fish like the sauger have to do this slowly to allow them to adjust to the change in pressure. Salmonoids on the other hand can take advantage of their great speed and rocket to the surface by essentially doing something many of you male fishermen can relate to. They release the pressure by belching. This also allows a small salmonoid to be released if caught out of these depths without harm.

SPECIAL K BARS

2 c white sugar 2 c white Karo syrup 3 c peanut butter 1 1/2 tsp vanilla 12 c Special K cereal

Frosting:

12 oz butterscotch chips 12 oz chocolate chips 2 tbsp butter Heat sugar & syrup to dissolve and beat with spoon until smooth. Beat in peanut butter and vanilla until well blended. Pour over cereal and stir again. Pack in large buttered pan. Melt chips and butter in double boiler over hot (not boiling) water. Spread over top of bars. Cut while warm.
